## **Optional Activities**

## Praying for God's Reign (For use with page 57)

Invite a young person (who has prepared in advance) to proclaim Matthew 6:31–34 as a reflection on valuing the Reign of God above all things.

Observe a few minutes of silence following the reading. Then pray together the Our Father.

# Acting Out Jesus Dialogues

(For use with page 58)

Have the young people form the four groups described under "The Values of Jesus" on page 58:

- the poor
- farmers, craftspersons, traders, and shopkeepers
- victims of discrimination
- close disciples

Have one person in each group portray Jesus. Challenge the young people in each group to make up possible dialogues with Jesus. (What would He have said to them about the world He envisioned? How would they have responded? What questions might they ask Him?) Then have each group act out the dialogue while the others serve as an audience.

#### Living Gospel Values

(For use with page 62)

Explain to the group that to live Gospel values means exactly that: We must put values into practice every day if we are to follow in the way of Jesus. Ask the young people to consider which Gospel value is needed in their lives. Allow them time to think and pray before writing in their journals a conclusion to each of the following:
